



Code of Conduct for Captains (2026)

Captains have a vital role to play in safeguarding cricketers in their team who are aged under 18.

All **Captains** should hold, at the very least, a valid **ECB DBS** certificate.

The ECB Coaching Philosophy states that good Captaincy is about providing a fun and safe environment in which people particularly children, can enjoy cricket, gain some success and be motivated to want to go on playing.

The philosophy ties into the ECB's own core values and in particular the 'Enjoyment' value which the ECB has identified as central to the ethos of the 'Safe Hands' Programme.

The guidance is intended for all those who Captain cricket teams which have players aged 18 or under participating.

- Captains must respect the rights, dignity and worth of each and every person and treat each equally within the context of the sport.
- Captains must place the well-being and safety of each player above all other considerations, including the development of performance.
- Captains must develop an appropriate working relationship with each player based on mutual trust and respect.
- Captains must not exert undue influence to obtain personal benefit or reward.
- Captains must encourage and guide players to accept responsibility for their own behaviour and performance.
- Captains must ensure that the activities they direct or advocate are appropriate for the age, maturity, experience and ability of players.
- Captains should, at the outset, clarify with the players (and where appropriate, the parents/carers) exactly what is expected of them and also what they are entitled to expect from their coach.
- Captains must co-operate fully with other specialists (e.g. other coaches, officials, sports scientists, doctors, physiotherapists) in the best interests of the player.

- Captains must always promote the positive aspects of the sport (e.g Fair Play) and never condone violations of the Laws of the Game, behaviour contrary to the spirit of the Laws of the Game or relevant rules and regulations or the use of prohibited substances or techniques.
- Captains must consistently display high standards of behaviour and appearance.
- Captains must not use or tolerate inappropriate language or behaviour.
- Captains must comply with the ECB “ Transporting Children to Cricket Activities Guidance”
- Captains are responsible for all players on the pitch in terms of Cricket related matters but not before and after matches and if there is an incident that requires the young player to leave the match. For this reason it is expected that a designated adult remains at the match for the duration of the match.
- Captains should never be alone in a changing room, sports hall, on a cricket field or in a motor vehicle alone with a player aged under 18.
- Mobile phones should not be used in the changing room or sports hall by under 18's or by adults (unless being used for coaching purposes and only with the authorisation of the under 18's guardian or Parent)
